

Charitable Organisations receiving funding from the Worth Abbey Parish Tithing Distribution 2013

The Society of Saint Peter the Apostle This is part of Missio, the worldwide network of Pontifical Mission Societies. Every year the SPA support the training of 30,000 seminarians and 10,000 religious sisters around the world

Vocational School Teachers' Salaries This was the charity we contributed to regularly but missed last year because of lack of information. It is used to pay the salaries of teachers in the Vocational School which is a private initiative of St. Matia Mulumba Parish. As a consequence of our withholding a grant last year, at the end of 2012 payment of teachers salaries were two months overdue

Mary's Meals "Our vision is that all those who have more than they need, share with those who lack even the most basic things, and that every child receives one daily meal in their place of education. Our mission is to enable people to offer their money, goods, skills, time, or prayer, and through this involvement, provide the most effective help to those suffering the effects of extreme poverty in the world's poorest communities. Our vision is that every child receives one daily meal in their place of education. Working together with those who share our ideas, we believe there is no good reason why that vision cannot be realised."

Housing Justice This is a Catholic charity which helps to house those who are homeless or threatened with homelessness

Turner's Hill Day Centre This is to re-open as a help to the aged in the immediate locality who live alone

Church Action on Poverty Church Action on Poverty works alongside people to help them make their voices heard and transform their communities.

Trussell Trust - Haywards Heath The Trussell Trust foodbank network works in partnership with local churches and organisations to bring foodbanks to communities across the UK. There are now over 260 foodbanks in the network

Open House Caring for the homeless in the locality.

Crawley Life House This is our local Life House helping young women from 16 – 25 years old who are homeless and pregnant (or with small children). The Life movement has had a strategic change of plan encouraging local people to support local houses rather than a central fund. (The house has recently and temporarily closed because of the suicide of one young woman.)
