The Most Holy Trinity (year B) 25th / 26th May 2024 No. 1384

Dear Parishioners

I hope that you and your families are well. I send my prayers.

Last Monday we entered again into Ordinary Time. After the celebration of Eastertide and the great feast of Pentecost, and all the seasons, starting with Advent, each with its own special character and celebration, this change may seem a massive anti-climax. Even the phrase, Ordinary Time, seems calculated to make us feel deflated. But maybe we are invited instead to recognise that every Sunday is equally a celebration of the Paschal Mystery, a kind of Easter in miniature, when we remember and are drawn again and again into the death and resurrection of Jesus with all that this promises. There is less fanfare, perhaps, but the reality is always the same.

Meanwhile, this Sunday we celebrate the Feast of the Holy Trinity, God the Father, God the Son, and God the Holy Spirit. St Irenaeus explained the Trinity saying that the Son and the Spirit are the two hands of God, through whom the Father created us and reaches out to us to draw us up into His love. We are invited to accept His invitation to become a part of the community which is God. Pope Francis expresses it: The Trinity is the communion of Divine Persons who are with one another, for one another, in one another: this communion is the life of God, the mystery of love of the Living God. We are invited to enter this mystery of God's love. By virtue of Baptism, we are part of His community. Pope Francis explains that this invitation of God must be reflected in our own lives and in our relationships with one another: to live in communion among ourselves on the model of that communion of God. We are called to live not without each other, over or against the other, but with one another, and in one another... to live in love mutually and towards all, sharing in joy and sufferings, learning to ask and to grant forgiveness. The service which God asks of us is to build up the Christian community: we are entrusted with the task of building ecclesial communities that are more and more a family.

In our gospel today we hear Jesus' command to his followers to *go and make disciples of all nations*. Please pray for the missionary work of our parish, that we may all be faithful to this calling and may build a community which reflects God's own communion in the Trinity.


Would anyone be able to join a group in your home area who could watch out for anyone who may not be able to attend mass for any reason?

This Sunday, 26th May, we will be singing the Sanctus (Holy, Holy) and Agnus Dei (Lamb of God) from Mass VIII. These chants are popular in other parishes both nationwide and worldwide, and they complement the 'de Angelis' Gloria which we sing regularly here at Worth Abbey.

This weekend there will be a Second Collection for The Missionary Endeavour of the Diocese (Diocese of Chulucanas).

The Diocese of Chulucanas, Peru, with which our diocese has a strong connection, is celebrating its 60th anniversary this year. In 1982, Bishop Cormac Murphy-O'Connor established the link with the Diocese of Chulucanas, which is in the north of Peru, sending priests from this diocese as a *Fidei Donum* (a gift of faith). The collection was introduced to support these priests. Although no Arundel & Brighton priests are currently serving in Peru, it continues to make an annual grant to the Diocese of Chulucanas.

The Norms for the Distribution of Holy Communion Under Both Kinds

When receiving Holy Communion, the communicant bows his or her head before the Sacrament as a gesture of reverence and receives the Body of the Lord from the minister. When Holy Communion is received under both kinds, the sign of reverence is also made before receiving the Precious Blood. The minister raises the Host slightly and shows it to each, saying, "The Body of Christ." The communicant replies, "Amen", and receives the Sacrament either on the tongue or in the hand. As soon as the communicant receives the Host, he or she consumes the whole of it. (GIRM, 161)

When receiving in the hand, the communicant should be guided by the words of St. Cyril of Jerusalem, writing around 400 AD: "When you approach, take care not to do so with your hand stretched out and your fingers open or apart, but rather place your left hand as a throne beneath your right, as befits one who is about to receive the King. Then receive him, taking care that nothing is lost."

The GIRM also states that Holy Communion distributed under both species is a fuller sign of the Heavenly banquet (no. 281). "Holy Communion has a fuller form as a sign when it takes place under both kinds. For in this form, the sign of the Eucharistic banquet is more clearly evident and clearer expression is given to the divine will by which the new and eternal Covenant is ratified in the Blood of the Lord, as also the connection between the Eucharistic banquet and the eschatological banquet in the Kingdom of the Father."

(Eucharisticum Mysterium, May 25, 1967, no. 32)

No one is required to receive under both species, but the Church does encourage it. If one only partakes in the Host, they must remember they are receiving the fullness of Christ – Body, Soul, and Divinity. Thus, it is the choice of the communicant to receive from the chalice.

For the reception of the Precious Blood, the GIRM, no. 286 states: "Each communicant, after receiving the Body of Christ, moves to the minister of the chalice and stands facing him. The minister says, "The Blood of Christ", the communicant replies, "Amen", and the minister hands over the chalice, which the communicant raises to his or her mouth. Each communicant drinks a little from the chalice, hands it back to the minister, and then withdraws."

The only ministers who communicate themselves are Bishops and priests. Deacons and lay persons are to be ministered to and are never to communicate themselves. For this reason, it is not proper, at any time, to take the Host to the Chalice and dip the Host into the Precious Blood.

Citizen Science

What is Citizen Science?

Citizen Science projects bring together scientists and public volunteers, to collect data. These projects are invaluable in conservation, making it possible to collect information that scientists alone would be unable to access. As well as helping advance research projects, becoming a citizen scientist is an amazing way to learn about plants and wildlife. https://growwild.kew.org/ Get involved in one of the following ways:

1. Nature's Calendar

Does climate change affect timings in nature? What effect has recent weather had on wildlife? The Woodland Trust's citizen science project, Nature's Calendar, is all about tracking the effects of weather and climate change on wildlife. By joining Nature's Calendar, you can contribute to a biological record dating back to 1736. Choose locations that you visit regularly where you can monitor one of more of your chosen species. Help us track the effects of weather and climate change on wildlife near you. Visit

2. National Plant Monitoring Scheme (NPMS)

While the popularity of citizen science projects is growing, plants have been left behind. The NPMS aims to survey abundance and diversity of plant species, the foundation of all our ecosystems, across different habitats in the UK. This helps us to understand the health of these habits. You will be randomly allocated at 1km square to visit near where you live, where you can record plant 'indicator species' in small plots. Visit https://www.npms.org.uk/ to find out how to get involved.

3. Flower-Insect Timed Counts

Flower-Insect Timed Counts (FITs) take ten minutes and can be done anywhere, including gardens and parks. It is a simple survey part of the UK Pollinator Monitoring Scheme (PoMS) that collects data on the total number of insects that visit a particular flower.

Spend ten minutes watching flowers and insects in good warm, dry weather during daylight hours.

4. Bee Walk

The bumblebee-monitoring project led by the Bumblebee Conservation Trust encourages you to learn how to identify bumblebees. Take a walk along a route once a month and record online which bumblebees you see. Visit https://beewalk.org.uk/ to get involved.
