Dear Parishioners

I hope that you and your families are well. I send you all my prayers.

Last week, Refugee Week, closed with a talk by Anna Pincus, director of the Gatwick Detainees Welfare Group. We are pleased to offer below the impressions of a guest in the monastery who attended, Harry Cooper.

It is easier — and often preferable — to look away from the suffering that is right in front of us. But Christ tells us through His actions and His parables, particularly those of the Good Samaritan and the Sheep and the Goats, that we must do the opposite. If we see our neighbour suffering, we must go to him immediately and help him in whatever way we can - even if we may be ridiculed by others for doing so. And because Christ focused His loving gaze on those whom society had cast out as unclean, damaged and offensive, we must do the same. In first century Palestine, it was lepers and prostitutes who were banished to the margins of society; now it is the homeless, convicted criminals and migrants.

It was with this in mind that I listened to Anna Pincus, the director of the Gatwick Detainees Welfare Group, on Sunday, who had come to share with us the suffering she had encountered in that context. A gentle voice and a smiling face could not disguise the fact that Anna was clearly made of stern stuff — something of undeniable importance for anyone who offers support to those at the edges of our society, or indeed, steps into one of the two detention centres that lurk out of sight by the runway at Gatwick Airport. Each week, she and her volunteers visit the locked-up men and women and families and simply sit with them. Sometimes they talk, sometimes they don't. But what they do is restore the dignity of the people they meet, no matter wot they may be.

Anna described in great and disturbing detail the effects of detention on the people she had met over the years. With fewer rights than someone accused of terror offences, asylum seekers who end up in detention are dehumanised almost immediately, stripped of their rights and freedoms and given little practical support to access legal advice or even their own families. (The UK is the only country which detains people indefinitely, and this leads to serious mental illness.) I was embarrassed that I had to be reminded that asylum seekers are not criminals, but for so long they have been demonised by the media and most mainstream political parties.

With migration levels rising across the world, Anna's work is even more contentious than before. This became apparent during the discussion. Anna managed the discussion quite calmly, and

light-heartedly pointed out that she wasn't running for Parliament and so had little say over national immigration policy!

Given how much anger there is at the moment about immigration, reflected in the tone of the general election campaign, how are we as Catholics to navigate this issue? There is a wide spectrum of opinion about the subject, which is of course to be expected. But it is also clear that our Lord seeks peace for us and for our communities to be based on mutual love and respect.

One suggestion is to consider the 1992 Catechism of the Catholic Church, an astonishingly detailed, balanced and extensive compendium of Catholic teaching in all areas of Christian life. On immigration it has this to say:

The more prosperous nations are obliged, to the extent they are able, to welcome the foreigner in search of the security and the means of livelihood which he cannot find in his country of origin. Public authorities should see to it that the natural right is respected that places a guest under the protection of those who receive him.

Political authorities, for the sake of the common good for which they are responsible, may make the exercise of the right to immigrate subject to various juridical conditions, especially with regard to the immigrants' duties toward their country of adoption. Immigrants are obliged to respect with gratitude the material and spiritual heritage of the country that receives them, to obey its laws and to assist in carrying civic burdens.

I read this with great interest, not least because it appears to calmly transcend the frustratingly simplistic political binaries of 'left vs right' or 'progressive vs conservative'. It reflects deep Catholic truths: that it is incumbent on us to provide a welcome to those who are searching for security, and to treat them with dignity. But it is also entirely legitimate to expect our governments to prioritise the common good by helping immigrants to integrate in society.

Our country has moved so far away from the Christian ideals upon which it was established; but as Catholics, we must do what we can, and show our neighbours what it means to be a person of Christian faith. We might consider St Benedict's chapter on the reception of guests: They must be received as Christ. We can also think of Anna Pincus and all those who each week quietly go into the Gatwick detention centres to love those who have been demonised, cast out and forgotten.

To cast a vote at the polling station it is necessary both to be registered and to have valid identification. **The General Election on 4**th **July** will be the first at which photo ID has been required.

There is an excellent range of election resources available to read and download with material from <u>CBCEW</u>, <u>CAFOD</u>, <u>CSAN</u>, <u>Gatwick Detainees Welfard Group</u> and <u>The Jesuit Missions</u> (which includes a Hustings Finder).

In preparation for the election, Cardinal Vincent Nicolls writes to us:

Cardinal Vincent Nichols, President of the Catholic Bishops' Conference of England and Wales, encourages Catholics to vote in this July's General Election:

"Engage with [parliamentary] candidates in any way that you can - you want to know what that candidate will think and say on your behalf, when that candidate gets into parliament.

"There are lots of questions you might want ask, there is a theme, though, that I would like to put forward and that is 'how do we seek to construct a society in which families can flourish?' that theme is the bedrock and all sorts of things flow from that...

"Criminal Justice depends a lot on the stability of family life; poverty and plenty and how we adjust and share the resources of our society; International Affairs and Education are important for the flourishing of family life, as are Life Issues, the beginning and ending of life, those principles that are so crucial to our mutual respect and regard for one another."

Cardinal Nichols signposts a number of resources in the recording which offer guidance on key topics of interest to Catholics. You can access these resources and find out more on the <u>Bishops' Conference Website</u>. The St Vincent De Paul Society (SVP) have teamed up with CAFOD to offer election resources with a particular focus on tackling poverty. You can find out more on the SVP website <u>here</u>.

CSAN has also published a resource called *Do Justice: A Vision for Spiritual and Civic Renewal in England and Wales*. The booklet sets out a renewed vision for the nations of England and Wales, centred on Christ and Catholic Social Teaching. It is an invitation to the Catholic communities of England and Wales to fulfil ever more deeply our baptismal vocation and it is the foundation of Do Justice. The General Election

With the important issue of a General Election on the **4**th **July**, WPE are going to concentrate on that for the next 3 weeks.

We steer away from politics as much as this is possible when dealing with climate and ecological issues as we focus on individual and community actions. While these are extremely important it is difficult to deny that our actions need to be supported - or at least not sabotaged - by our government.

With this in mind CAFOD have created an interesting piece on questions that we - as Catholics - should be asking any candidates we meet at hustings or on our doorsteps.

Here is one extracted from that article - the full text of which can be found on the CAFOD website CAFOD.org.uk/encounter (and some hard copies of which can be found in the Narthex)

'Some of the world's poorest communities are facing the greatest burden of the climate crisis. With millions of people already displaced as a result of extreme weather events, how would you support working with other countries to raise new taxes from the most polluting industries such as shipping, aviation and fossil fuels to support countries suffering the impacts of climate catastrophes?'

Community Food Hubs

In October West Sussex County Council launched a six-month pilot project to encourage people to take advantage of surplus food rescue services and food waste prevention education sessions, which in turn, works to reduce the amount of edible food that ends up in people's household rubbish bins. Due to the success of the pilot, working with UKHarvest and other partnerships and charities, in 2023 the programme was extended running until April 2024. The programme prevented over 37 tonnes of food going to waste, provided food to over 11,000 people with over 70% of residents saying that they reduced food from going to waste at home. The programme has been extended for a further 12 months, running once a month across every district borough until April 2025:

<u>Haywards Heath</u> (second Friday of the month from 1000-1100) next date **12**th **July** at Ascension church, 100 Vale Road, Haywards Heath, West Sussex, RH16 4JS

<u>Crawley</u> (third Wednesday of the month from 1000-1100) next date **17**th **July** at Broadfield Community Centre, Broadfield Barton, Crawley, RH11 9BA

Horsham (fourth Wednesday of the month from 1000-1100) next date **24**th **July** at Chanctonbury Leisure Centre, Spierbridge Road, Storrington, Pulborough, West Sussex, RH20 4PG

Each district and borough will host a UKHarvest community food hub once a month where, for a small donation, people will be able to pick up a wide selection of surplus foods which would have otherwise ended up as waste from suppliers

Worth Pro Earth (Cont.)

The Lead Bishop for the Environment, Bishop John Arnold, has written:

to the leaders of the main political parties to ask them to take environmental issues seriously during this summer's election campaign. Thanking them for their service in public life, Bishop John highlighted the urgent need to address global warming and its consequences as predictions now show the earth is warming at a faster rate than previously thought, writing:

"The challenge of climate change is urgent, and its effects are already being felt across the world, often affecting the most vulnerable communities who have contributed least to the crisis. It is a challenge that can only be addressed by global co-operation, together with support for countries that are less able to afford a transition away from carbon-intensive fuels."

Bishop John has called on the parties to show strong leadership in the global endeavour to reduce carbon emissions; ensure the UK assists poorer countries to meet their targets and obligations; produce credible policies to reduce net carbon emissions to zero by 2050; and commit to working with key institutions like schools and faith communities to help them act as good custodians of the natural world. <u>Click here</u> to visit our website and read Bishop John's message in full.
